Support the Children of Belarus this Christmas

For children having treatment in the Cancer Hospital in Minsk this year has been especially hard, with all the restrictions over visits and family contact adding to the usual anxiety and stress, and the constant fear of the virus and the impact it would have on their

weakened immune systems.

We hope very much that it may be possible to invite children in remission to the UK again next summer.

But in the meantime, through our partners 'Children in

Trouble' we would like to provide Christmas presents, help with parties and celebrations and other support the children might need at this time.



£10 would buy a gift for a child spending their Christmas and New Year in the hospital.

Or you might prefer to support our ongoing work with children and young people in Gomel Region. The work of our **Home Hospice Team** has now expanded, so that alongside staff funded by the local Health Department, they



are supporting many families outside the city of Gomel.

Family Home 2000 at Klimovka will celebrate its 20th Anniversary at the end of this month. A

permanent home for Liena, Greesha and Ira, it has been a much needed temporary home for many young people who have developed their independence skills under the wonderful support of

independence skills under the wonderful support of our carers, Larissa, Sasha and Tanya.



Rodni Kut is home to four young people with both physical and learning disabilities. This is the first time in 17 years that Anya has not been able to visit her family in Devon, and the other young people have missed out on their sanatorium holiday.

They have still had a happy summer with their Papa Sergei and carers, and we would like to help them celebrate Christmas as we all look forward to a better year ahead for them and for everyone in Belarus.



Respite Project at Rechitsa

This project, originally sponsored by one of our Trustees, Brian Hardwick, has been a great success and we hope to continue it. Olga and Maxim are young people with very mild learning disabilities and they have been providing respite care to more profoundly disabled children.

When they arrive at Vanya's flat he gets very excited. He clearly loves their visits and that they are genuinely fond of him, and proud of their achievement in looking after him. They also look after a boy with Down's Syndrome and

another with learning disabilities, sometimes in their own homes and sometimes at Dom Dominic, where they live with a small group of young people.

Fund Raising

We have had some fanatastic support in this difficult year from our host families, Holiday Camp Volunteers and other supporters. Eleanor and Simeon Waters, with the support of the rest of their family raised over £1,000 by walking the whole 95 miles of the Staffordshire Way. They are enthusiastic members of our Endon group and the children have all been involved with hosting Belarusian teenagers every summer of their lives till the Covid crisis made this impossible.






Julie Raftery and Matt Hansen were organising a half marathon for CCP, but it was cancelled because of Coronavirus. So they took up litter picking instead and raised an amazing £1,730 for CCP. They gathered 76 large bags of rubbish between them and were joined by other local people in their campaign in Leicestershire. 'It is good for the environment, good for the children of Belarus, keeps you fit and is quite addictive!' says Julie.

Julie also organised the 'Croft Canter' in September to support Air Ambulance and Chernobyl Children's Project. The 10 mile trail run raised a fantastic £1,972.50 for CCP. Julie usually supports activities for the Endon teenagers during the summer holiday as well as raising funds for us every year.

United Nations Children's Fund

The UNICEF funded project in Gomel, led by Natasha Samoilik, Director of our partners 'Supporting Children Together', is making great progress in placing babies and young children into families.



Five children were returned to their birth families in September, seventeen were prepared for adoption and have already met their prospective new parents, and no children entered the home except for three who need palliative care. There are now just 46 babies and young children in the home and half of them are palliative. The aim is to transfer all reasonably healthy children to families and turn the home into a Palliative Care Centre.

During September training programmes were run social workers





babies being sent to the Baby Home; and for foster parents on the development and care needs of babies and toddlers and the importance attachment.

As part of the project

wonderful equipment has been bought to help children in the home to sit and stand.





Koshilova they will be using all and techniques learned during the UNICEF project over the last couple of years to support families with children with disabilities.

Using case management and a child centred approach, they will be encouraging all services - education, health and social protection - to work together to meet the developmental and social needs of the children in the project, and to give their families the advice, support and encouragement they need.

Training programmes have already taken pace in each of the districts covering complex assessment of the children's needs and the principles of case management.
